Introduction


In February we held the project's second engagement period. The event ran from 15 February to 21 March and included a variety of formats, including mail-outs to local residents, a series of films and two online drop-in sessions. 106 households responded to the questionnaire - 59 filled out the online version and 47 people returned the survey by post. We have summarised the key responses and comments to each section within this booklet.

Public Online Drop-ins Summary

We held two online drop-in meetings on MS Teams and Zoom on Thursday 26 February 2021 and Tuesday 2 March 2021. Seven people attended the first session and six people attended the second. The meetings were hosted by the Means and chaired by Karakusevic Carson Architect's Senior Engagement Manager. The panel included the Project Manager from Haringey Council, the Development Manager from Selby Trust and two members of the design team.

Key points/feedback by theme:

- Selby Centre Location

 Park front is preferred from a safety and
 activation point of view. More footfall might
 decrease anti-social behaviour.
- Crime & Vehicle Access
 Gang activity, crime and issues with speeding mopeds along the N17/N18 border was mentioned by several community members.
 Design team will work with Met police and local people to understand how proposals could help address this issue.
- Community Growing
 The local gardening group wants more
 engagement with the design team to talk
 about growing space, e.g. possibility of access
 to water. Design team will schedule meeting
 soon and Selby Trust will talk to group about
 working together on gardening.
- Access to Sport

 Concern that the facilities will become too

 expensive and not for locals even with the

expensive and not for locals even with the best intentions. Team assured attendees that that at the heart of the project is providing affordable facilities for local people.

Other topics also discussed were ensuring the right balance of lighting for people and wildlife, adequate parking for Selby and sports, and ensuring that local heritage, especially around cricket, is represented in the design proposals.

Key points/feedback by theme:

- Selby Centre Location Attendees positive about all proposed locations for the Selby Centre.
- Access & Affordability of Sports Sports affordability is a key concern but there is an acceptance of the need for some level of commercial use to subsidise community use.
- Health, Sports & Other Offers Enquiries about other offers such as sports therapy, physio and disability sports by a few attendees. Important to ensure flexibility of spaces to allow for a range of uses and users.
- Intergenerational & Inclusive Queries about how the design team will ensure spaces and facilities are inclusive of all, and promote intergenerational activity.
- Provision for Spectators In addition to the informal spectator seating on the mound in the park, there was a suggestion that the sports hall have seating to enable events and bring in more visitors.

Other topics covered were heritage of cricket in the area, a request for a running trail around the park and a sprint track if possible. Attendees also asked about the programme slipping. There is a clear ambition to get onsite in early 2022. Covid-19 did cause some delay, but we are back on track.


1 - How we propose to make links to local amenities & tie into surrounding streets

We asked survey respondents to identify key local amenities in the area. The map we presented highlighted local destinations that the new development will help connect, and also included some of the ideas we are exploring directly around the Selby Centre site. The most frequently used destinations are shops on Tottenham High Road, Fore Street and Middlesex Hospital, which is often travelled to by foot via Bull Lane.

Which local amenities do you use the most?




Are there any other facilities or amenities that you use in the local area that we've missed from the map?




2 - How we propose to draw in the wider community

Within the public engagement, we proposed four key principles in which the new urban village could draw in the wider community. These were to create clear foot and cycle routes, provide a mixture of indoor and outdoor sports facilities, make general park improvements and create an open and welcoming Selby Centre. Many survey respondents highlighted the need to provide greater advertising around the area to give more information about the site's services.





2 - How we propose to draw in the wider community



Are there any other ways we could be drawing in the wider community?

Regular advertisement/promotion of events and activities.

Clear signs or banners around the surrounding roads that point towards the Selby Centre - not enough people know where it is.

Raising awareness through the Haringey newsletter/magazine.

Adult education (ESOL) basic English & Maths. Resources for under 14's in holiday times.


Help kids to learn about nature by providing eco areas, where they could feel they are 'in nature' and learn more about animals and plants.

3 - How we propose to put Selby Centre at the heart of the new urban village

We proposed three approaches to the new Selby Centre's position on the site, influenced by our ambition to put it at the heart of the urban village, but also by phasing so we can minimise disruption to existing organisations at the centre. Selby Centre located in the park is the most preferred option, with many respondents highlighting it's ability to provide greater views across the park.

4 - How we propose to ensure a sensitive massing strategy?




What is a massing?

No tower blocks.


Taller buildings surrounding the park font will create an enclosed, cut off park.





Based on an illustration of the proposed park layout, we asked survey respondents to tell us how they felt about the design and which features they would prioritise. Most people feel very positive or positive about the park proposals, however there are quite a few concerns about it being over-dominated by sports (particularly football) without much space left for wild areas, picnics, biodiversity and kids activities.





The 11 a-side pitch is too big, couple of 5 a-side pitches could be better. They are currently taking up too much space. More trees and paths preferable.

Taller buildings on the site should be abandoned. This will destroy the beauty of the area.

The council needs to look seriously about the rubbish issue.

Just very pleased something is coming to the area.

Some community education and advertising should be necessary, as few know of the Centre.

Make it happen quickly!

Selby Centre has its own car park right now, I wonder if locals would have parking problems with this project.

I do worry about having houses built near to the current entrance/current Selby Centre/current car park as I feel it would be very disruptive to the local residents.

I like the idea of wider pavements and bike lanes. Would that also include diverting some of the car traffic?

We look forward to see more detailed plans.

Glad that this project is moving forward, exciting that sustainability is a key driver.

It would be great to meet the London Wildlife Trust team of architects.

We are excited about more family orientated activities to do with our grandchildren. And for sports facilities in the area: as long as we can still walk the dog there we will be happy.
